## Make your voice heard and VOTE on November 8, 2022

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### Election Day is November 8, 2022

You can request your Absentee Ballot NOW Mail your AV ballot by October 20, 2022

Your ballot must arrive at your clerk's office by 8:00 p.m. on November 8, 2022

Many townships, municipalities and villages have proposals and amendments on the November 8, 2022, ballot. Please visit vote411.org for your specific ballot proposals or contact your local clerk.



### VOTE EARLY

Michigan voters can also vote before Election Day through a process called absentee in-person voting. The period for absentee in-person voting runs from Thursday, September 22, 2022, to Monday, November 7, 2022, but dates and hours may vary based on where you live. Check with your local clerk for hours before you go.

### What to bring

You will be asked to show current photo ID to vote in Michigan. Acceptable forms include: Michigan driver's license or state ID card; current (non-expired) driver's license or personal ID card issued by another state; federal or state government-issued photo ID; US passport; military ID card with a photo; tribal ID card with a photo; or a student ID with a photo from a

high school or an accredited institution of higher education.

### All registered voters are eligible to vote BY MAIL

Due to the passage of the statewide ballot proposal 18-3, all eligible and registered voters in

Michigan may now request an absent voter ballot without providing a reason. Check your voter

### Requesting an absent voter ballot

Voters may request an absent voter ballot or accessible voter ballot in a variety of ways. Voters

can complete an online application at Michigan.gov/Vote or submit an application, large print

application, letter, or postcard to your local clerk. Find your local clerk at Michigan.gov/Vote.

Requests for absent voter ballots may be returned by hand, via postal mail, fax or email, as long

as a signature is visible.

### Options for Straight Ticket, Split Ticket and Mixed Ticket Voting

Michigan law allows voters to vote "straight ticket" in a general election, which means voters may

fill in one rectangle or box next to a party name to cast a vote for every candidate of that political

party. Michigan also allows for voters to select the straight party option but then cast votes for

individual candidates of a different party ("split ticket").

### **Candidate Responses**

1. EDUCATION: What should Michigan do, if anything, to 1) provide an equitable, quality public education for all students and 2) address the shortage of teachers?

**Jordan Genso - Dem** We should all agree that teaching should be a comfortably middle-class profession. Which means we absolutely need to pay them more. (Full disclosure: my wife is a high school teacher, and yes, I believe she is worth more than she's paid.) If we increase the State Education Tax – a statewide property tax millage – by 2 mills (so a \$200,000 home

would see a \$200 increase in property taxes), that would raise nearly \$800 million, which could provide every teacher a \$9,000 raise. To me, that's a worthwhile tradeoff.

5. Invest in our community colleges and universities again to reduce tuition rates and make college affordable for everyone.

Lana L. Theis - Rep Candidate did not respond by print deadline.

**Jon Elgas - Lib** I believe that a local school board is better equipped to address these issues. The more the Michigan State School board and the US department of education forces a one sized fits all upon the schools will only worsen teacher shortages, and sacrifice any quality education that the schools have for an agenda that the people who run those departments might have. **Victoria McCasey - UST** Candidate did not respond by print deadline.

## 2. ECONOMIC SECURITY: What policies do you support to help Michigan residents improve their economic position

**Jordan Genso - Dem** I would like to shift the tax burden off of working families and the middle class. The trend over the past several decades is that whenever a change occurs, the net result is a shift of the tax burden off the wealthy and onto everyone else. I would like to undo those shifts, by significantly increasing the Earned Income Tax Credit (to help working families), and raising the cap on the Homestead Property Tax Credit (to help the middle class).

Lana L. Theis - Rep Candidate did not respond by print deadline.

**Jon Elgas - Lib** I would want to get rid of the personal income and property tax, thus freeing up your hard earned money to save or spend on how you chose.

Victoria McCasey - UST Candidate did not respond by print deadline.

## 3. ELECTIONS: What state policies do you support regarding Michigan elections, campaign funding and voting rights?

**Jordan Genso - Dem** First, we must acknowledge that any change in voting procedures that would result in a legal voter having their vote suppressed is just as harmful to the integrity of our elections as a fraudulent vote that is counted. So I oppose any change to our elections that would prevent more legal votes than illegal ones (recognizing that fraudulent voting is effectively non-existent, meaning the current safeguards are sufficient). Aside from that, I support reforming our elections, to have ranked-choice voting, and I support policies that work to remove the corrupting influence of campaign donations.

Lana L. Theis - Rep Candidate did not respond by print deadline.

**Jon Elgas - Lib** I would support ranked choice voting, a permanent forensic audit of all elections, a photo ID (or two non photo ID's) to vote, I would support spending caps on races. The race for a state wide race would have a higher cap that of a state legislative branch, which would have a higher cap than a county position.

Victoria McCasey - UST Candidate did not respond by print deadline.

4: ENVIRONMENT/ENERGY: What actions or policies do you support to protect Michigan's water, air and land for current and future generations? What is your position on energy efficiency and renewable energy?

**Jordan Genso - Dem** I strongly support policies that acknowledge the externalities found in our carbon-based energy system, where businesses place the cost burden on the public to account for their activity, rather than paying for it themselves. So at the national level, I'd like to see a carbon tax. One thing I'd like to see our state do to protect our resources is to first acknowledge that property rights are not so unconstrained as to allow a

corporation to pull unlimited water from the ground without paying for it, so I'd want to see a 1 cent/gallon tax on companies bottling our water and selling it.

**Jon Elgas - Lib** I am a let the market decide without interference form local, state, or federal bureaucracies.I

# 5. SOCIAL JUSTICE: How would you address racial, economic, health and education inequities, including Michigan's 23% of children and 17% of seniors living in poverty?

**Jordan Genso - Dem** As a Realtor, I recognize the lasting consequences from past policies, such as the racist policy of redlining. My grandparents could purchase a home wherever they wanted, but some of my peers can not say the same. And the harms from those policies still exist, so I would want to see the state government provide extra resources and funding to those areas, to help bring up their property values to be comparable to others nearby that weren't harmed by redlining. I think that is a moderate approach to addressing current inequities, as it's about geography which was undeniably and specifically targeted for racist purposes.

Lana L. Theis - Rep Candidate did not respond by print deadline.

**Jon Elgas - Lib** I would encourage the people of Michigan to help their neighbors, and would work to remove barriers that encumber charities and private people to do so.

Victoria McCasey - UST Candidate did not respond by print deadline.

## 6. GUNS: What steps, if any, should be taken to curb gun violence in our communities?

**Jordan Genso - Dem** The first step is to place the same liability on someone who gives a firearm to someone else that we place on someone who gives alcohol to someone else – if the person they're giving that firearm to isn't legally allowed to possess it, then the supplier should be criminally liable (just like giving alcohol to a minor). When it comes to the firearms themselves, it would be preferable for it to be addressed at the national level, but I recognize that there is a difference between firearms designed for defense, and those designed for combat, and the latter should be regulated like fully-automatic firearms.

Lana L. Theis - Rep Candidate did not respond by print deadline.

**Jon Elgas - Lib** No matter what laws get put in place those who wish to commit a crime with a gun, will find a way. The best defense is to put a gun in the hands of a good guy, who wants to have one. I have no problem requiring a gun safety course in order to obtain a gun.

1. EDUCATION: What should Michigan do, if anything, to 1) provide an equitable, quality public education for all students and 2) address the shortage of teachers?

**Sam Singh - Dem** Our schools are the foundation for our communities and building blocks for our future workforce. As State Representative, I served on the Appropriations Committee and fought for equitable funding, so all schools had the resources to help kids reach their potential. We need to expand funding so we can fully invest in early childhood programs, career technical education (CTE), and special education. We need to address the teacher shortage crisis by increasing salaries for teachers and lowering classroom sizes. We also need to provide additional resources so schools can hire more career counselors, nurses, and behavioral health specialists. **Daylen W. Howard - Rep** Candidate did not respond by print deadline.

## 2. ECONOMIC SECURITY: What policies do you support to help Michigan residents improve their economic positions?

**Sam Singh - Dem** The State must work with industry, labor, and local leaders to help strengthen existing companies and attract new business. In addition, the state needs to invest in talent and workforce initiatives that help residents grow their skills so they can have access to well-paying jobs. We need to support and expand Michigan's Reconnect program so people can acquire more credentials, certificates, and degrees without taking on crippling debt. The State needs to partner with the building trades to expand CTE offerings in the K-12 schools & fund more apprenticeship programs to ensure that we have a workforce that is ready when older workers retire.

**Sam Singh - Dem** I believe that voting is a constitutional right and that we should not create unnecessary barriers for someone to exercise that right. I supported the 2018 "Promote the Vote" Constitutional ballot initiative which provided Michigan voters with: Timely distribution of absentee ballots for military/overseas; Registration by mail up to 15 days before an election; In-person registration extended to Election Day with proof of residency, No-reason absentee voting; and a Statewide audit of election results. In addition to those items, I support providing more resources to local clerks and allowing them to start counting absentee ballots earlier.

4: ENVIRONMENT/ENERGY: What actions or policies do you support to protect Michigan's water, air and land for current and future generations? What is your position on energy efficiency and renewable energy?

**Sam Singh - Dem** I am an ardent supporter of Governor Whitmer's MI Healthy Climate Plan which calls for economy-wide carbon neutrality by 2050. As Mayor of East Lansing, I was proud to sign the US Mayor's Climate Protection Agreement in 2007 which led to the City's first Climate Sustainability Plan. While I was in the State Legislature, I was the lead Democratic negotiator for the 2016 Bipartisan Energy Law that increased renewable energy and energy efficiency goals in the Republican-led legislature. I also support increased funding for the Great Lakes and water infrastructure so we can protect our state's drinking water.

# 5. SOCIAL JUSTICE: How would you address racial, economic, health and education inequities, including Michigan's 23% of children and 17% of seniors living in poverty?

**Sam Singh - Dem** I support a set of targeted tax cuts and credits that would support lower income families, children, and seniors. One such tax credit that I support is the bipartisan proposal to expand the Michigan Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) to 30% of the Federal level. The EITC would put money back in the pockets of low wage workers so they can pay their bills and support their families. We also need to remove barriers for people who want to work such as the cost of childcare and transportation. We need to expand cost sharing programs that would allow businesses to partner with government to help their workers access childcare & transportation options.

## 6. GUNS: What steps, if any, should be taken to curb gun violence in our communities?

**Sam Singh - Dem** The tragedies in Oxford, Michigan and Uvalde, Texas illustrate that the current system is not stopping gun violence in our schools and our communities. There are several common-sense laws that have broad support amongst Democrats and Republicans that need to be pursued. We need to eliminate any loopholes from universal background checks, pass safe storage requirements, and to implement "red flag laws" that keep guns away from people that are known threats to themselves or others.

## **Candidate Responses**

1. EDUCATION: What should Michigan do, if anything, to 1) provide an equitable, quality public education for all students and 2) address the shortage of teachers?

**Mark Ludwig - Dem** I have many years of experience as a substitute teacher. Having met hundreds of teachers over three decades I believe the shortage is primarily driven by the disgusting falsehoods and belligerence all too common in todays right wing rhetoric. I will support our educators by highlighting the many positives of public education. I will also aggressively push back on the lies being spread by shedding light on the actual work of educators

## 2. ECONOMIC SECURITY: What policies do you support to help Michigan residents improve their economic positions?

**Mark Ludwig - Dem** The modest progress made recently on infrastructure needs to continue to keep us competitive with peer states. I also support reigning in the parasitic health insurance industry which gives very little value for their exorbitant and stupidly complex gatekeeping. Climate adaptation and clean energy should be a jobs bonanza and a top priority.

## 3. ELECTIONS: What state policies do you support regarding Michigan elections, campaign funding and voting rights?

**Mark Ludwig - Dem** While I in no way believe our election system is insecure, the bald-faced, treasonous lies of former President Trump have eroded confidence in our elections to the point that hearings and legislation may be warranted to restore confidence in elections. The continued expansion of dark money needs to come to an end, all money spent to influence elections need full, timely disclosure

4: ENVIRONMENT/ENERGY: What actions or policies do you support to protect Michigan's water, air and land for current and future generations?

What is your position on energy efficiency and renewable energy?

**Mark Ludwig - Dem** The climate crisis is accelerating far faster than expected. Aggressive actions are needed to speed up renewable energy development including ending the caps on private grid connected solar systems, explicit legalization of off shore wind, development of pumped storage systems and grid modernization. Agricultural adaptation must be aggressively promoted as well. Expanding no till and similar systems would help with adaptation and runoff pollution issues. I would support the line 5 tunnel if it is built large enough for additional use as a transportation tunnel. The loss of EPA authority over GH gasses will require legislative action.

# 5. SOCIAL JUSTICE: How would you address racial, economic, health and education inequities, including Michigan's 23% of children and 17% of seniors living in poverty?

**Mark Ludwig - Dem** A: We need reform of the tax system to more fairly distribute this burden. The federal child tax credit was clearly helpful during the covid crisis and could be implemented by Michigan if the feds don't bring it back. Lowering health care losses and inefficiencies due to insurance companies would help all levels of society. Addressing all these issues in the longer term requires investment in struggling communities, both core cities and rural areas. I would work with local leaders to understand their specific needs rather than attempting to impose top down solutions.

## 6. GUNS: What steps, if any, should be taken to curb gun violence in our communities?

**Mark Ludwig - Dem:** I support universal background checks and a well crafted, constitutionally sound red flag law. I also believe it is important for gun owners like myself to avoid the dubious notions that guns are going to be a significant part of social problem solving. I also personally avoid loose talk of political violence, even metaphors. It is frankly rather scary seeing so many people talking about civil war and other political violence. We must de-escalate this rhetoric to keep our politics viable.

1. EDUCATION: What should Michigan do, if anything, to 1) provide an equitable, quality public education for all students and 2) address the shortage of teachers?

#### Julie Brixie - Dem

1. Make sure we're working with the brightest minds in education when we make decisions about our children's education, not the DeVos family.

2. Create Incentives to recruit students into teaching profession.

3. Invest in pediatric literacy programming and establishing universal preschool.

4. Invest in the early childhood reading coaches and classroom support staff so every child has the one-on-one support they need to read at grade level.

5. Invest in our community colleges and universities again to reduce tuition rates and make college affordable for everyone.

**Norm Shinkle - Rep** We must address the basics in education. Students must be able to read and write when they graduate. Teachers should be rewarded based on their success with students.

## 2. ECONOMIC SECURITY: What policies do you support to help Michigan residents improve their economic position

**Julie Brixie - Dem** Creating a climate that attracts and expands jobs in MI is key to helping residents. The additional federal unemployment relief during the pandemic was crucial for helping Michigan families. The strong economic recovery shows how providing families with resources to meet their basic needs results in good outcomes for all. We should extend unemployment to 26 weeks moving forward. Prior to the pandemic wages had been very stagnant. Tightening job markets and rising wages are good for people looking for work, but not so good for small business owners and the service industry. Rising inflation makes rising wages necessary and important.

**Norm Shinkle - Rep** Government should not prohibit Michigan residents from achieving their dreams. Taxes are high enough. Common sense should be used to solve problems, not higher taxes.

## 3. ELECTIONS: What state policies do you support regarding Michigan elections, campaign funding and voting rights?

**Julie Brixie - Dem** I do not support the 55 voter suppression bills passed by Republicans since the 2020 election.

We must continue to protect people's right to vote and promote voting among all Michigan citizens.

We also need to allow early processing of absentee ballots, which have increased dramatically due to proposal 3 and covid concerns. I have cosponsored such measures, but they have not received a hearing.

Campaign spending is out of control and should be limited. I am currently working on bipartisan legislation to address dark money in elections. Voting rights are a fundamental part of our nation and state and must be protected for all citizens.

**Norm Shinkle - Rep** Election trust should be restored. Voters should show photo ID to vote to make this happen. If someone can't afford ID, it should

be provided for them. This is common sense. Every citizen should be able to vote but vote only once. Every citizen should be able to contribute to a campaign without unreasonable restrictions.

# 4: ENVIRONMENT/ENERGY: What actions or policies do you support to protect Michigan's water, air and land for current and future generations? What is your position on energy efficiency and renewable energy?

**Julie Brixie - Dem** If we're going to be successful tackle climate change, we must establish a state-wide plan to achieve 100% renewable energy production by 2050. It's deeply ironic that the Capitol is currently having a geothermal system installed, which will make the Capitol 100% renewable. Yet, lawmakers inside haven't seen the value in establishing a plan to achieve 100% renewable energy production. I am also working to increase energy efficiency, recycling and a statewide septic code to address the thousands of failing septic systems that are polluting our waters.

**Norm Shinkle - Rep** We should be good stewards of our land and water. We should be aware of the unattended consequences of actions such as the killing of animals after spraying for beetles in the 60's. Renewable energy is good if it doesn't hurt our standard of living. the market will provide energy and government incentives are often not the best way to get there. Common sense solutions should prevail.

**Julie Brixie - Dem** The first thing we have to do is increase the minimum wage to ensure people working full time are not living in poverty.
